2. Lesson or Unit Objective/Outcome

The students will analyze Anne Bradstreet's
attitude toward loss through an exercise in

paraphrasing her poem, "Here Follow Some Verses Upon the Burning of Our House, July 10, 1666."

3. Lesson Plan

- a) Set [gets students "set" for learning]

Read: The headlines of the morning paper. Ask: "Do you think any good can come from such tragedy?"

- b) Delivery [outline of lesson plan]

- 1) Discuss set.
- 2) Ask students to read silently as teacher reads poem aloud.
- 3) Explain the English poets would invert sentences to keep strict meter and rhyme.
- 4) Ask students to partner with someone to find and define unfamiliar words and to rewrite 5 inverted lines.
- 5) Ask students to share their definitions and changes with the class.
- 6) Read the poem again aloud including many of the students changes.
- 7) Discuss the meaning of the poem.

- c) Closing [recap, transition or assignment, etc.]

.Ask students as homework to write a paraphrase of the poem which captures her attitude toward loss..

Biblical Worldview Focus Question:

How does Anne Bradstreet's attitude toward loss connect with the bigger picture of

God [the nature, character and role of God]? God is our only hope.

Creation [what is made and sustained by God]? Everything belongs to God.

Mankind [who and what humans are]? Mankind often loves his possessions more than he loves God.

Moral Order [moral behavior and responsibility]? The moral order of God is not an option.

Purpose [the intention and meaning of all that exists]? God only wants our obedience.

- **Knowledge:** list, tell, identify, show, label, collect, examine, tabulate, quote, name, etc.
- **Comprehension:** summarize, describe, associate, distinguish, estimate, differentiate, explain in their own words, discuss, articulate, etc.
- **Application:** apply, demonstrate, calculate, complete, illustrate, show, solve, modify, relate, change, use, classify, experiment, etc.
- **Analysis:** analyze, separate, order, connect, classify, arrange, divide, compare, contrast, select, determine, decipher, predict, interpret, infer, etc.
- **Synthesis:** combine, integrate, modify, rearrange, substitute, plan, create, design, invent, compose, formulate, generalize, etc.
- **Evaluation:** assess, decide, rank, grade, test, measure, recommend, convince, select, judge, defend, discriminate, support, conclude, etc.
